Established in 1964 Longtown Outdoor Learning Centre continues to be a popular choice for Schools wishing to escape the classroom for a refreshing and memorable outdoor adventure.

Previously owned and operated by Northamptonshire County Council, the Centre is now managed by a team of local staff and trustees who together form Longtown Outdoor Learning Trust. The building and land retain its strong historical connection to Northamptonshire under the ownership of The Wilson Foundation — a Northamptonshire based Youth Development Charity.

We now welcome children, young people and adults from across the UK.

Free planning visits & Unique Site & Quality Badge places

We comfortably accommodate 75 visitors between the Old House and Monnow Wing with the extended option to camp for a further 60 residents during the summer months. We have a choice of communal areas between the Main House and Monnow Wing, plus the Barn and Hive, so there's plenty of space for groups to get together and celebrate their achievements with a hot chocolate in the evening or whilst roasting marsh mallows around the campfire! The possibilities at Longtown are endless and we work with each school individually to create a memorable residential experience for your students.

An exciting new development comprising an extended dining hall, catering kitchen and campers' showers is due for completion in 2023.











Location


Situated on the Herefordshire and Monmouthshire border the Centre is set within the quaint linear village of Longtown — just 25 miles from the M50 and 30 miles from the M4. Cardiff, Bristol and Birmingham can all be reached within an hour or two.

As you approach the village, the uniqueness of our rural and natural environment is revealed amongst the rolling countryside and mountains. Our 16 acre site includes traditional farmland, surrounded by rivers, fields and mountains plus our very own woodland. A Norman Castle can be reached within minutes, by foot from our doorstep. Off site activities typically take place within 45 minutes of the Centre and showcase some of the most impressive landscapes in the Brecon Beacons National Park, Black Mountains and Wye Valley.

Accommodation

Accommodation is allocated according to your group size and needs. Stay in the charming and historic Court House, more modern Monnow Wing or under Canvas dring the warmer months.

The Court House — The charming and historic Court House provides a clean, warm and comfortable base for a maximum of 40 people. The Court House has 7 dormitories over 2 floors sleeping between 4 and 8 children plus staff bedrooms for single or double occupancy depending upon group size and student/ teacher ratio. Wash hand basins in all dormitories plus toilets on the central landing. Shower facilities are provided in the new shower block plus a private Staff shower room on the ground floor. First floor shared bathroom.







The Monnow Wing — adjoining the Old House the Monnow Wing can sleep up to 35 people in shared bedrooms. These rooms typically have bunk beds and single beds, sleeping groups of 2, 3 and 4. Accessible rooms are located on the ground floor. Bedrooms in the Monnow Wing without an en-suite have shower facilities in the shower block in the courtyard.

The Court House and Monnow Wing together comfortably accommodate groups up to 75 people.



Base Camp - Base camp is situated within the Centre's grounds next to 'the hive'- a timber clad building providing a comfortable dining and social space. Comprising of 12 Bell Tents each accommodating 4-8 children or up to 3 staff. The Bell tents come with sleeping mats (or camp beds and mattresses for staff). Sleeping bags can also be provided at no additional charge.



The toilets and showers are just one minute's walk from the camp along a well-lit path throughout the night. The Campground is enclosed by fencing and locked gates with a single pedestrian gate to access the toilets. Base Camp is available May to September and can accommodate upto 60 people in total.

The Lodge - Due for completion in 2023 our proposed new dining hall, catering kitchen and camper's showers.

We are committed to ensuring that residential outdoor learning opportunities are open to all irrespective of age, gender, ethnicity, disability, religion, financial hardship or social circumstances.

Financial Help

We offer affordable experiences with a range of pricing options dependent on the time of year, accommodation selected, length of stay and programme choice. We operate two bursary funds to enable all children, regardless of financial circumstances to take part in our courses. We don't want anyone to miss out and both of these funds make it possible for those who wouldn't normally be able to afford such an opportunity to be included at generously subsidised rates.

Additional Needs

We have experience of working with a broad range of additional needs including reduced mobility, visual and hearing impairments and a range of mental health issues. We are able to adapt our programmes to meet a range of needs including activities that are suitable for wheelchair users, for example;

- 2. Hill Walking (assisted) on the Blorenge
- 3. Canoeing on the Brecon & Monmouthshire Canal
- 4. Onsite Rock Climbing / High Ropes

The Monnow Wing is Equality Act compliant with an electric profiling bed, portable hoist and shower commode.

We also have a range of portable ramps so all internal communal areas can be accessed at ease.

Residential breaks are available from 2 to 5 days. A Packed Lunch is included from day 2 to departure day. Times stated in the sample programme above may vary for shorter stays and smaller groups.



Catering

Breakfast and Dinner are served in the Dining Room, Barn or Hive according to the group size and season.

A self serve Breakfast of cereals, toast and fruit is included each morning and children prepare their own packed lunch daily to include a choice of sandwiches, crisps, fruit and snack.

Dinner times include a traditional homecooked 2 course meal.

Special diets and food allergies and intolerances can all be catered for with advance notice.

Educational Visits Advisory Service

Subscribing to the advisory service will allow your school access to:

- Specific expert advice concerning Educational Visits from Mike Fawcett, Head of Longtown Outdoor Learning Trust and accredited member of the National Outdoor Education Advisers Panel (OEAP)
- Nationally approved training courses for Educational Visit Coordinators and Visit Leaders
- Support and guidance in the interpretation of OEAP National Guidance
- Access to the eVisit web based system for Educational Visit planning linked to OEAP National Guidance. This system will enable the school to run its own system for the planning and approval of Category A and B visits, whilst Category C visits will be reviewed and approved by Mike Fawcett.
- The Visit Emergencies Support Network (VESN). This offer comprises
 5 experienced members of OEAP who provide support to schools in
 neighbouring counties in the Midlands. If a critical incident occurs
 and Mike Fawcett is not available to provide advice and support then
 schools may contact any of the other VESN advisers. Access to the
 VESN enhances the capacity, expertise and resilience of schools.

Training for Planning and Leading Educational Visits

As a registered provider for the Outdoor Education Adviser Panel we are able to deliver courses to school staff who take responsibility for leading, planning or co-ordinating educational visits and other learning outside the classroom activities. These courses enable employers to fulfil their health and safety at work act obligations to provide appropriate training to staff aligned with national guidance. Educational Visit Coordinator (EVC) training remains valid for 3 years, while Visit Leader training requires periodic updating.

Educational Visits Coordinator Training Course

This one-day nationally accredited training course covers aspects of the law related to educational visits, risk assessment of visits, and the administrative requirements associated with off-site educational activities.

The course will enable EVCs to plan and manage their schools' educational visits and off-site activities in line with national guidance and current good practice. It will also help to fulfil their health and safety obligations.

This course is aimed at new and existing EVCs (re-validation courses are open to those within 6 months of their current expiry date, otherwise you will need to complete a new full course).

Key outcomes

- Enhanced knowledge and understanding about the effective supervision of young people taking part in off-site activities and visits
- Greater confidence and ability to act as the Education Visit Co-ordinator
- Increased competence in assessing and managing risks on off-site visits

Visit Leader Trainina

OEAP accredited Visit Leader training is either offered as a half day (3.5 hours) theory module or a full day course (6.5 hours) which combines both theory and practical modules. Both theory and practical modules cover risk benefit assessment and provide opportunities for being updated on national best practice for keeping children and young people safe whilst learning outside the classroom. The full day course includes practical coverage of vehicle safety, supervising road crossings, managing safety near water and in public access venues. Part of the course is delivered outdoors, so you will need to bring stout footwear and suitable warm and waterproof clothing with you.

We develop children and young people's ability to overcome challenges, which builds motivation, perseverance and commitment.

LEARNING OUTSIDE THE CLASSROOM QUALITY BADGE

The LOtC Quality Badge is the only national award combining the essential elements of provision - learning and safety - into a trusted accreditation scheme for all types of learning outside the classroom. The Department for Education guidance on Health & Safety on educational visits recommends that schools look for the LOtC Quality Badge when choosing

external providers of educational visits. This includes all on-site activities that are not 'in-scope' for the AALA regulations (see above).

RISK ASSESSMENTS / RISK BENEFIT ANALYSIS

All risk assessments are checked by Adventure Activity
Licence Service and are reviewed and updated
yearly. We also have external technical advisors to
oversee our risk assessments and they also play an
active part in our staff development. Our staff are
always assessing risk on a daily basis especially whilst
delivering activities in a changeable environment.

STAFF COMPETENCE AND QUALIFICATIONS

All staff will either hold a relevant National Governing Body (NGB) qualification, or a statement of competence signed by an appropriately experienced and qualified person consistent with the requirements of the Licensing Regulations. Copies will be available for inspection on site.

CHILD PROTECTION AND DBS

Our policy is consistent with current good practice and meets current statutory requirements. Enhanced Disclosure and Barring Service (DBS) checks are carried out on all staff.

SUPERVISION

The legal Duty of Care is with the Visiting Leader/
Teacher. Centre staff are on duty or on call — 24 hours.
